Content	This course gives students the theoretical understanding and fundamental skills they need to develop land and housing, particularly low-income housing and affordable housing in urban areas. Conflicts involving land development and housing supply are covered in this course in relation to urban planning, general socio-economic factors, and sustainability.
	The presentation will be divided into two sections; the first portion covers land policy, housing markets for land and urban areas, and land development. We will talk about urban socio-economic development and land development together.
	The policy of providing low-income persons with affordable housing is covered in detail in the second lecture. Students must be able to comprehend housing-related activities and interventions from a public policy standpoint as well as from the perspectives of other academic fields like sociology, economics, urban planning, environmental science, and management.
	Students will be asked to comprehend land and housing laws from many nations, particularly the experiences of the developing world, even though this course primarily focuses on the Indonesian setting.
